Join us for a day on Georgia's Antebellum Trail. Our narrated driving tour will include the historic little town of **Oxford, Georgia** that gave birth to **Emory University**. Today the entire little town has been designated a Shrine of the Methodist Church. How did it all happen? It's tied in with the history of a southern born soft drink called Coca-Cola, and we'll tell you the entire story!

Covington, Georgia is next. Known for her antebellum and Victorian homes, we'll take time to drive through the town before continuing on to **Social Circle** for lunch at the **Blue Willow Inn**. The Blue Willow has quickly made a name for itself as the place to go for real southern cooking – served in a gracious manner in a charming old mansion on the main street of Social Circle. It is not an understatement to say that the Blue Willow Inn is truly one of the South's top restaurants!



After lunch we will visit **Madison, Georgia**, “The Town Sherman Refused To Burn.” Incorporated in 1809, Madison's antebellum homes remain virtually intact. In the mid 1800's “Harper Weekly” called Madison “the most picturesque town in Georgia.” Today great old oak and magnolia trees frame these magnificent homes that have been carefully tended through the years. We will tour two homes, visit a historic church, and hear the stories of when “the Yankees came to town.”
